New Students

Continuing Students

Students are required to successfully complete all courses in Year 1 before they can proceed to undertake courses in Year 2. Please continue to follow the prescribed course of study given.

Advice For Managing Course Load Most students carry between 1-3 courses per semester. For the working adult, we recommend that you do not attempt more than three (3) courses per semester and two (2) courses in the summer.

Plan wisely to suit your particular situation so that you may perform at your full potential. Do not jeopardize your long-term goals by being unrealistic about what you can handle.

Social Work and Youth Development Work are intrinsically related; therefore, this **BSc Social Work with Minor in Youth Development Work** seeks to offer students a rich blend of aspects of the human services that are urgently needed to address current societal issues that exist or are emerging in this 21st Century environment. This alignment of Social Work (Major) with Youth Development Work (Minor) offers students an exciting opportunity to explore and benefit from compatible and supplementary areas of academic interests that will make them stand out in the job market and in applying for graduate studies.

The programme seeks to equip the region's professionals and volunteers with the requisite knowledge, skills and competencies to contribute meaningfully to the practice of social work and the issues of youth development work across the Caribbean region and elsewhere. The programme is delivered online using the Open Campus "Learning Exchange" environment (Moodle/Learning Management System).

The structure of the **BSc Social Work with Minor in Youth Development Work** reflects the progression of intellectual growth and promotes student success. The courses at Level 1 are the foundation and introductory-level courses. Levels II and III of the programme comprise the courses offered in the Social Work (Major), the Youth Development Work (Minor), and the Free Electives. All courses in this proposed structure are drawn from the Open Campus' existing undergraduate programmes in Social Work and Youth Development Work in particular, as well as from the Sociology and Psychology programmes for the Free Electives.

The BSc Social Work with Minor in Youth Development Work programme operates under a semester system.

• Semesters 1 and 2 have thirteen (13) weeks of instruction each, plus an examination period. • The summer session has seven (7) weeks of instruction plus the examination

Prerequisites for Matriculation into the BSc Social Work with Minor in Youth Development Work Programme

- Mathematics Requirements: For entry to the Undergraduate programmes, an approved qualification in Mathematics is required. The minimum Mathematics requirement is a pass at CSEC or the equivalent. Candidates who do not meet this requirement must successfully complete the approved remedial Mathematics course, MATH 0900 Mathematics, which is offered in semester 1, 2 and the summer.
- English Language Requirements: The English Language Proficiency Test (ELPT) is used to
 assess whether applicants to the Undergraduate programmes possess a satisfactory level of
 writing and reading proficiency in English for university academic purposes. ELPT is a prerequisite for FOUN1001: English for Academic Purposes. For those persons requiring ELPT,
 please check your site office for more details. The earliest offering of ELPT is TBD.
- Technology Requirement: Students will need to have access to a computer with Internet access.
